SAMUEL SEBASTIAN WESLEY (1810-76)

Towards a Bibliography of his Church Music

Introduction.

While I am certainly not an expert in the music of S. S. Wesley I have unexpectedly found myself dealing with it in this year of the centenary of his death. I was surprised to discover that, so far as I could tell, no authoritative list of his church music existed, and to provide myself with some foundation material I set to work to make one to the best of my ability in the short period available. For what it may be worth, and provisional as it must be, this is printed below as a small contribution to Wesley studies. It takes no account of his hymn tunes and chants.

I have added notes on dates and successive publications so far as this information, however incomplete or uncertain, has come my way, in the hope that the list may thus serve as a step not only towards a proper listing of Wesley's church music, but also towards establishing its chronology and textual history. The last is a difficult problem, not only because of Wesley's carelessness in writing and his inadequate proof reading, but because it is evident that he revised his works, making it necessary for us to know the sequence, if not the exact dates, of the appearance of successive editions.

Notes.

(A) The NO-IMPRINT ISSUE. This term is a title of convenience invented by me for a printed issue consisting of 'O Lord, thou art my God', 'The Wilderness', and an incomplete work, 'To my request and earnest cry'. The title of the whole is ANTHEMS,/—By—/Samuel Sebastian Wesley./which is executed in Gothic lettering apparently stencilled in outline, a feature of significance to be alluded to later. There is no publisher's, printer's, or engraver's name. Each piece is paged separately, and there is no pagination for the issue as a whole. Copies survive at St. Michael's College, Tenbury Wells, Worcs., and at Leeds Parish Church. I suggest the background to this may have been as follows:

In its issue for 15 October 1840 *The Musical World* (vol. 14, p. 252) carries an announcement of *Six Anthems* by Wesley, 'just published' at one guinea and a half, and prints a list of subscribers to 122 copies, headed by the Queen Dowager, with an explanation that the subscription price is more than had at first been intended. Already, in an earlier issue (8 Oct.), this journal had begun a review, not (be it noted) under the title of *Six Anthems* but of *Anthems* by S. S. W. The review was continued on 15 Oct. and 29 Oct., giving a detailed account of the first two anthems ('O God [recte Lord], thou art my God' and 'The Wilderness') but unfortunately telling us not so much as the titles of the remaining four. Moreover, though a continuation of the review in a future issue was promised, no more appeared.

It is very extraordinary that not a single copy of this album of Six Anthems by Wesley is known today. The only explanation I can think of—which is in itself extraordinary—is that the 'No-imprint Issue' represents specimen pages issued as a preliminary to the intended Six Anthems; that the review in The Musical World was begun from those specimen pages; that the announcement of Six Anthems was imprudently premature; and that for some reason this was never published.

Nothing more was done for some time about publishing a collection of Wesley's anthems, though in a letter to R. A. Atkins, organist of St Asaph Cathedral, dated 5 August 1848 and now belonging to the University of Edinburgh, he writes,

I am completing a set of Anthems for Cathedral Services, original Anthems. Do you think I could get your subscription for a set of 8 copies at 25 shillings a copy? If two thirds of the Cathedrals favour me with their subscriptions, I shall publish.

This probably adumbrates the appearance of the album discussed in note (B)

- (B) TWELVE ANTHEMS. Again a title of convenience invented by me to cover a collection of twelve anthems issued in three forms, presumably in the following order:
- (i) An album in score published by Arthur Hall, Virtue and Co., 25 Paternoster Row, London. No specimen of this album as such appears to have survived, but its existence is sufficiently attested by extant separate copies of 'The Wilderness', 'Blessed be the God and Father', and 'O Lord, my God' published by that firm and carrying a double pagination, one applicable to separate issues, the other to a collected album. Moreover, each of these separate copies has a common cover with the title 'ANTHEMS/BY/SAMUEL SEBASTIAN WESLEY./Vol. 1' followed by a numerical list of twelve anthems. We do not know the date of this publication, for though the cover carries the legend 'Copyright Works', no entry is found in the index to the Registers of Stationers' Hall. It was on sale as late as 1861 (see Hall, Virtue's advertisement in 'Praise the Lord, O my Soul' of that year); nevertheless, common sense suggests it antedates (ii) and (iii) below.
- (ii) Wesley himself also issued separate voice parts of these twelve anthems (each voice part containing all twelve works) in lithographic form with printed cover listing them in the same sequence as (i) above. A set of parts, lacking the tenor, is at the RCM. Inside the cover is an announcement of 'Original Anthems in score by Dr S. S. Wesley Second Edition . . . at Subscriber's Terms'. In spite of some difference in the title, this seems to point towards (iii) below.
- (iii) The well known album in score of 'Anthems/BY/SAMUEL SEBASTIAN WESLEY./VOL 1', the title within an engraved oval, with the imprint 'London, Addison and Hollier, 210, Regent Street. [J.A.] Novello, Dean Street, Soho, and Broadway, New York.' The twelve anthems it contains are the same, and in the same sequence, as (i) and (ii) above. The dedication to Thomas Garnier, Dean of Winchester, is dated 1853 and the publication must have appeared by October 1854 when the British Museum acquired its copy. There is an overall position overall pagination of the volume and a separate pagination for each item. In the complete form this publication consists of title-page, dedication independent of the publication consists of title-page, dedication, index, contents (words of the anthems), subsidiary titlepage identical in every detail with the title-page of the 'No-imprint issue' (a curious link), 259 pages of music, subscribers' list, and a page of advertisements with the filte-page of the of advertisements; there should also be an errata slip, and a slip containing the taining the names of additional subscribers, including Sir Frederick Ouseley This the names of additional subscribers, including Sir Frederick Ouseley. This, then, seems to be the subscribers' issue, or second edition advant, then, seems to be the subscribers' issue, or second edition, advertised in (ii) above. Although both (i) and (iii) are designated 'Vol 1', no further volume appeared.

III. APPENDIX

- 'Almighty God, give us grace', 'Blessed Lord, who hast caused', and 'O Lord Jesu Christ' are adaptations by J. F. Bridge of solos entitled Sacred Songs, the Collects for the first three Sundays in Advent.
- 'The Bruised Reed' is a sacred song, in C. D. Hackett's National Psalmist, 1839.
- 'Glory be to God on high' is designed for use with Communion Services, though often classed as an anthem.
- 'O remember not' is a duet by Samuel Wesley with a few extra bars added by S. S. Wesley for SATB.
- 'Thou, O God, art praised in Sion' is by Samuel Wesley, edited by S. S. Wesley.

Postscript. The whereabouts of Elgar's orchestral score for 'Let us lift up our heart' is at present unknown. Elgar offered it to Messrs. Novello, who considered it inappropriate to accept (as Jerrold Moore has been kind enough to tell me) because at that time the anthem was not in their current catalogue, and the 'Three Choirs' chorus sang from the edition of a different publisher.
