
## Fourth Sunday of Lent (B)

Psalm 136, vv 1-6; refrain v 6

- 1. By the rivers of Babylon there we <u>sat</u> and wept, remem<u>ber</u>ing Zion; on the poplars <u>that</u> grew there we hung up our harps. *R*
- 2. For it was there that they asked us, our captors, for songs, our oppressors, for joy.'Sing to us,' they said,'one of Zion's songs.' *R*
- 3. O how could we sing the song <u>of</u> the Lord on an a<u>lien soil?</u>
  If I forget <u>you</u>, Jerusalem, let my <u>right</u> hand wither! *R*
- 4. O let my tongue cleave <u>to</u> my mouth if I remem<u>ber</u> you not, if I prize <u>not</u> Jerusalem above all my joys! *R*

The refrain is heard three times at the start: first played on the organ, then sung by the cantor, and then sung by all; it is then repeated by all after each verse.
