The Choir with the Priest

Priest Answer

8 O Lord, o-pen thou my lips. And my mouth shall shew forth thy praise.

8 O God, make speed to save me. O Lord, make haste to help me.

8 Glo - ry be to the Fa - ther, and to the Son, and to the Ho - ly Ghost. As it was in the be-gin-ning, is now, and e - ver shall be, world with - out end. A - men. Praise ye the Lord.____

After the Canticles

8 Lord, have mer - cy up-on us. Christ, have mer - cy up-on us. Lord, have mer - cy up-on us.

The Choir with the Priest

8 I be - lieve in God the Fa - ther.... (etc., then 'Our Father...') And lead us not in - to temp - ta - ti - on. But de - li-ver us from evil. A - men.

Priest Answer

8 O Lord, shew thy mer - cy up-on us. And grant us thy sal - va - ti-on.

Priest Answer

8 O Lord, save the King. And mer-ci-ful - ly hear us when we call up-on thee.

Priest Answer

8 En - due thy Mi-ni-sters with right - e-ous-ness. And make thy cho-sen peo - ple joy - ful.

Priest Answer

8 O Lord, save thy peo - ple. And bless thine in - he - ri-tance.

Merbecke's black notation has three basic note-lengths, the equivalent of breve, semibreve and minim, and he also uses dotted semibreves and an additional symbol for a held note at the end of a phrase. The notation has been rendered here with stemless noteheads according to the following proportions:

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
